The PORT ADELAIDE (2,553 teu) has joined TS Lines

Hong Kong-based TS Lines has recently taken in charge the 2,553

teu PORT ADELAIDE (Naikai 2500) which it bought in July from Japanese owner Osaka Asahi Kaiun Co Ltd, for a reported USD 6 M. The vessel has been renamed TS MANILA. She is deployed by the Hong Kong carrier between China and the Philippines. The TS MANILA was built by Japan's Naikai Zosen shipyard in 2007 originally as the HANJIN PORT ADELAIDE. She features a deadweight of 33,100 tons, a Loa of 199.95 metres and a beam of 32.20 metres. She is fitted with 400 reefer plugs and is of gearless configuration. She is part of the 'Naikai 2500' series, of which 23 vessels were built from 2003 to 2011
